Local Business: OmMade Peanut Butter

Radhika Murari transformed a hobby of making nutritional snacks for her son into OmMade Peanut Butter, a local company with national acclaim. She infuses sustainability and environmentally sound practices into her production.

• Local Elected Official: Elaine Tholen, Dranesville School Board Representative

Elaine managed the Fairfax County Public Schools Get2Green Program and helped found NoVA Outside, for which she co-chairs their Student Environmental Action Showcase.

• State Elected Official: Delegate Kaye Kory

Kaye Kory is a leader in the Virginia legislature who sponsored passage of a bill enabling the creation of local Green Banks throughout the Commonwealth.

Dr. Gerald Durley and Prof. Katharine Hayhoe, and previous awardees HAH Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew, Bill McKibben, the Sioux Nation, James Hansen and Wendell Berry.
